## **Stroke Care - Every Minute Matters**

Stroke is a stop in the flow of blood to the brain either by blockage (clot) or by hemorrhage (bleeding) in the brain. Stroke also is a leading cause of serious long-term disability, reducing mobility in more than half of stroke survivors over age 65. ## **The Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center:**

# Combining State-of-the-Art Treatment Technology with a Personal Touch, Close to Home

The last thing you want after you or a loved one gets a cancer diagnosis is to wait to discuss treatment options, and then travel far from home to receive that treatment in a large, potentially impersonal facility.

The Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center at FHN Memorial Hospital in Freeport provides the latest state-of-the-art treatment usually only found at university hospitals, allowing patients to receive timely, outstanding, personalized treatment and care without traveling far from family, friends, and other support systems.

According to Cancer Center Director Julie Nampel, the Center treated nearly 400 new patients in 2018, administering more than 4,000 chemotherapy and radiation treatments. "We provide individualized care with board-certified, experienced physicians and staff through a team-focused approach," Nampel says. "Each patient's therapy is determined and planned by a team of highly skilled, caring specialists. We also provide hematology services for patients in need of that care."

## Dr. Shaikh Provides the Latest in Chemotherapy Treatment



FHN's board-certified hematologist and medical oncologist, Arshad Shaikh, MD, has provided leading-edge chemotherapy to FHN patents for more than 10 years, and has recently seen promising results from immunotherapy treatments. A revolutionary approach for treating certain types of cancer, immunotherapy boosts the body's natural

defenses to fight cancer, allowing one's immune system to do the heavy lifting in battling the cancer cells.

"Immunotherapy has been one of the cornerstone treatments of the future of cancer and we at the FHN Cancer Center have been on the front line in the usage of immunotherapy," Dr. Shaikh says. "There are many tumor types that can now be considered for treatment and the indications are only expected to broaden. I have seen a remarkable benefit across various cancers with immunotherapy, particularly melanoma."

Dr. Shaikh says that while utilizing the latest in research and technology in treatment is imperative, a holistic personal and spiritual approach can't be overlooked. "Establishing a heart-to-heart connection is personally the most important criteria to me," he says. "While I strongly believe in modern medicine and carefully selecting treatment strategies for patients that would both reduce side effects while enhancing the chance for cure, I am a person of faith and have seen the benefit of this application when approaching patient care."

### Dr. Koneru and POG Provide Leading-Edge Radiation Therapy

FHN's alliance with Paramount Oncology Group (POG), an innovative cancer care organization based in Dubuque, lowa, allows us to provide state-of-the-art stereotactic radiosurgery that precisely targets radiation in fewer high-dose treatments than traditional therapy, which can help preserve healthy surrounding tissue, greatly improving patient outcomes.

Bobby Koneru, MD, board-certified radiation oncologist, founder



and president of POG, provides treatment to Cancer Center patients four days a week, giving local patients the very latest in research-driven care.

While Dr. Koneru is a national speaker in the high-tech world of radiation treatment, he doesn't lose sight of his patient-centered approach.



"Every patient is different. Everyone is unique. I try to understand what the patient's needs are and try to make a collaborative decision between standard recommendations and what the unique needs are for the patient and their family," explains Dr. Koneru.

"I've worked in large academic centers and several smaller clinics, and what really stands out about this facility is the quality of the staff, the personal touch that they add, and how much they genuinely care about their patients. They really take their time to get to know them and their needs."

"Even though this is a smaller center, we offer all of the latest technologies that any major academic center would offer in the radiation world," Dr. Koneru shares.

### The Latest in Radiation Treatment Technology

Made possible by generous gifts contributed by FHN Foundation friends, an upgrade was recently completed for the Cancer Center's external beam radiation machine, or linear accelerator. This state-of-the-art technology performs Image Guided Radiation Therapy (IGRT) along with Intensity Modulated Radiation Therapy and Volumetric Arc Therapy that can deliver the dose to the entire tumor in a 360-degree rotation, typically in less than two minutes. "This upgrade will allow for much greater precision in targeting tumors, thus minimizing the damage to adjacent tissues," Nampel says. "It will also extend the life of the equipment for an additional six years."

#### **All Without the Wait**

FHN guarantees a follow-up appointment within three business days after a patient receives the report that he or she has cancer.

"Patients at other treatment centers may wait weeks or even months to consult with a specialist and start setting up treatment plans," Nampel says. "That time can be filled with stress, anxiety, and uninformed dread. Our quick follow-up can help patients come to terms with their situation and address it with leading-edge, university-level medical oncology and radiation therapy under one roof, close to home."

It also has furniture that converts into beds should family members want to remain close.

The adjacent lounge, accessible both from the corridor and the patient room, includes a sink, couch, table with chairs and small refrigerator. It provides a warm, quiet place for family members to gather for discussion, prayer or rest.

When the **Freeport Community Foundation** contacted Hospice about donating funds from the **Craig Wilson Memorial Fund**, we decided it was the perfect time to brighten up the space.

Not long after, Sharon Kunas, the daughter of former FHN volunteers **Paul and Carolyn Crank**, along with her brother Andy

Crank, expressed interest in dedicating their parents' memorial gifts to support a Hospice project.

Jack Ross generously donated the memorial gifts of his wife, **Margie Ann Ross**, to support the new artwork.

Sharon Kunas and Andy Crank were excited to see their parents' memorial gifts support this project. "FHN, and especially FHN Hospice, were an important part of our parents' lives. Heart Care

An all-digital lab and comprehensive diagnostic services, including a state-ofthe-art imaging system with CT scanner and nuclear Gamma camera. This allows physicians to see the vessels and anatomy of the heart, as well as the finest vessels all the way to the fingertips. Vascular lab uses non-invasive diagnostic technology with no dyes, x-rays, or needles to visualize veins and arteries and determine the best course of treatment. Services include exercise and pharmacological stress tests; EKG; echocardiogram; carotid studies; and a 30-day event monitor.

A new reporting platform for both stress tests and the cath lab allows for greater efficiency. New stress test computers with updated software provides patients with quicker, more accurate readings. We are also excited to have Laura Mack MSN,RN-BC CNL, serving as our new clinical nurse leader. She will be a huge asset to our patients, and assist cardiac services in providing quality care and outcomes for them.

Cancer Care

Sophisticated imaging diagnostics with a 3-day follow up guarantee, along with surgical expertise for a broad range of cancer diagnoses. The Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center at FHN Memorial Hospital provides state-of-the-art treatments usually only available in university hospitals. Equipped with an Image Guided Radiation Therapy (IGRT) machine and a 4-D CT scanner to increase accuracy and enable our experts to use a higher dose of radiation while detecting and planning for the smallest movements. This technology allows us to offer Volumetric Modulated ARC Therapy (VMAT), also called SmartArc or RapidArc radiation therapy.

A recent upgrade to our Linear Accelerator (radiation machine) allows us to target a patient's tumor from more angles and with greater precision, causing less damage to healthy tissues. In addition, we are very excited about upcoming growth in the field of Immunotherapy. This therapy enhances an individual's own immune system and gives it the power to fight certain cancer cells. Research on Immunotherapy continues to grow and will allow us to fight more types of cancer with these medications.

Proven wound care practices and advanced clinical approaches, including the latest in wound care products, dressings, antibiotics, and hyperbaric oxygen therapy (HBOt) to help heal patients who suffer from chronic wounds. HBOt enhances the body's natural healing and strengthens the immune system. It is a non-invasive, effective treatment option for most chronic wounds. Our team of multidisciplinary specialists at the Center for Wound Healing at FHN achieves some of the best healing rates and fastest healing times in the nation.

The Center for Wound Healing is looking into expanding our wound center, as well as the number of treatment rooms, to meet the needs of our patients. Advanced wound care continues to evolve and we hope to increase our footprint with our state-of-the-art hyperbaric oxygen treatment.

Vein Care Innovative diagnostics and treatment services can relieve leg pain and provide long-term solutions to venous diseases like varicose veins, leg sores, or even more serious circulation problems like blood clots. Services offered at FHN's Vein Center include endovenous laser ablation, among others. All procedures are performed on an outpatient basis with typically rapid recovery. Noncosmetic treatment options are covered by most commercial insurance carriers, including Medicare.

We are focused on continuing to give patients an intimate team approach that will successfully treat their venous insufficiency. Patients meet their personal 'Vein Team' at their first consultation and stay with them throughout treatment. We have also added a female provider to our team and moved our treatment center to the first floor of FHN Memorial Hospital to offer greater access and convenience.

A wide variety of services including orthopaedic diagnosis, treatment and surgery, physical therapy and occupational therapy, as well as a full range of sports medicine capabilities. We treat conditions from broken bones and strained or sprained ligaments to issues with the spine and joints – including total joint replacement. Our TruMatch™ knee replacement system is customized to fit each patient and helps FHN's surgeons operate more efficiently, eliminating some steps in the surgical process and offering the best possible outcome. FHN is the first hospital in the area to offer TruMatch.

FHN Orthopaedics now offers an anterior approach to total hip replacement surgery. This technique is less invasive and allows the patient to recover more quickly. We also have a new Surgical Nurse Navigator who gives helpful guidance to patients throughout the entire orthopaedic surgical process. In addition, Rehab Services is excited to bring back the Pelvic Rehab program, which provides assessment and treatment to patients with various types of urinary incontinence and pelvic pain syndromes.

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Just how serious is the problem of teens using e-cigarettes? vors like mango and mint (menthol) and minimizes the amount Very, according to both the U.S.Surgeon General and the FDA commissioner.

At a January public hearing on e-cigarettes and teen vaping, FDA Commissioner Scott Gottlieb said he is "horrified" at the recent rapid rise in teenagers using e-cigarettes, and threatened to take the products off the market if tobacco companies don't stop marketing to teens:

> **ff** I'll tell you this. If the youth use continues to rise, and we see significant increases in use in 2019, on top of the dramatic rise in 2018, the entire category will face an existential threat."

> ••It could be 'game over' for some these products until they can successfully traverse the regulatory process. I think the stakes are that high."

Late last year, U.S. Surgeon General Jerome Adams, MD, issued an urgent advisory, calling the widespread use of e-cigarettes by teens an epidemic:

> •• The recent surge in e-cigarette use among youth, which has been fueled by new types of e-cigarettes that have recently entered the market, is a cause for great concern. We must take action now to protect the health of our nation's young people."

According to one report<sup>1</sup>, E-cigarette use among high school students increased 78 percent in 2018, reaching 20.8 percent. That means more than 3.6 million U.S. youth, including 1 in 5 high school students and 1 in 20 middle school students, currently use e-cigarettes.

## Not 'Harmless'

One of the most popular e-cigarettes on the market today, the JUUL, looks like a USB flash drive. It comes in kid-friendly flaand odor of "smoke" exhaled, making it easy to conceal.

All JUUL e-cigarette pods have a high degree of nicotineabout as much as a pack of 20 cigarettes, according to the Surgeon General's report. They also use nicotine salts, which allow particularly high levels of nicotine to be inhaled with less irritation than with other e-cigarettes or traditional cigarettes.

Nicotine is highly addictive, and studies suggest it can harm the developing adolescent brain, affecting learning, memory, and attention. Using nicotine in adolescence also can make a person more prone to addiction to other drugs later in life.

## **An Alternative to Smoking**

Most e-cigarette brands, including the JUUL, advertise themselves as a healthier alternative to regular cigarettes, or even as an aid to help smokers guit. Researchers are studying the effectiveness of using e-cigarettes in this manner, and the evidence so far is mixed.

The evidence is quite clear, however, on the risk of youth using e-cigarettes: A 2018 National Academy of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine report states that any e-cigarette use among young people is unsafe, even if they do not progress to future cigarette smoking.

### **FDA Action**

Last year, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) proposed a nationwide age limit of 18 to buy e-cigarette products, and announced plans to further restrict the marketing and sales of flavored nicotine products.

This January, the FDA also announced it is exploring ways to help teens break their addiction to nicotine. Healthcare providers don't have much information on how to treat teens for nicotine addiction: Commonly available drugs and patches aren't approved for use by people under the age of 18.

## **HELP YOU QUIT SMOKING?**

E-cigarettes have some of the same health risks as regular cigarettes, including raising your risk of heart attack, heart disease, and stroke. "If you're just replacing cigarettes with e-cigarettes, you're not really reducing your health risk," says FHN Chief Physician Executive James Kolka, DO. "The best thing you can do, if you smoke, is to work with your provider to find the best way to help you quit."

A recent study found that people who used e-cigarettes to help them quit smoking were more likely to be successful for at least a year than those who used nicotine patches, lozenges or gum, so for some people, using e-cigarettes to "ease" your way away from nicotine instead of going "cold turkey" may help you to quit.

Quitters using e-cigarettes were asked to follow the same regimen as those using nicotine gum, patches or lozenges: Set a quit date and use the nicotine replacement when cravings struck.

The study's author reported that the subjects using e-cigarettes were nearly twice as likely to have been successful at one year than the other subjects. When the other subjects had the help of prescription medications like Chantix®, however, one-year success rates were the same as or higher than for those who used e-cigarettes.

#### Choose What You and Your Provider Decide is Best for You

The FDA hasn't approved e-cigarettes as a stop-smoking device, but that is how many people start vaping. Most experts agree they're at least slightly less dangerous than smoking, but e-cigarettes still expose you to nicotine and a host of other potentially harmful chemicals.

And though they don't pose the fire hazard of cigarette smoking, e-cigarettes can malfunction and literally blow up in your face - an exploding e-cigarette killed a man in Texas earlier this year.


#### Physical Therapy on the Move


