A HIDDEN GEM: Carol Anderson's Journey with the Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center

For Carol Anderson of Forreston, healthcare at FHN had always been reliable, routine, and reassuring. "I always had great labs and appointments," she recalls. "Dr. Miller and I often joked that I was such an easy patient." With no family history of cancer, she never imagined the Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center at FHN Memorial Hospital in Freeport would become such a central part of her life.

That changed after a routine check-up with her longtime primary care provider, FHN Family Medicine Physician Terry Miller, MD. Just before leaving, Carol mentioned an unusual feeling in her stomach.

"Since you never complain about anything, let's take a closer look," Dr. Miller said. A CAT scan quickly followed, and within days, Carol received the life-altering diagnosis: Stage 4A ovarian cancer.

"It would have been so easy to put it off," Carol says, "but I am grateful I had a doctor who really listened."

Carol began her treatment in Madison with a series of tests and major surgery. Still recovering, she knew she wanted to arrange for her ongoing care closer to home. With the help of a nurse navigator, she transitioned her care to the Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center at FHN Memorial Hospital in Freeport – a decision that, in her words, changed everything.

"I walked into the Cancer Center, and it was calm ... it was peaceful," Carol says. "Amanda and Natalie at the front desk, no matter what was going on in their lives, always wore huge smiles. I felt like, wow, things might just be OK."

Though the emotional toll of her diagnosis was heavy, Carol was lifted by the support of her friends, family, and her new care team led

by FHN Medical Oncologist Arshad Shaikh, MD, and oncology nurse Kathy. Treatment was just 20 minutes from home, allowing her husband, coworkers, friends, and even the family dog to be part of her journey. "I never felt like I was going through cancer treatment," she says. "The nurses often laughed and said it was more like a party. They knew exactly what I needed to get through this."

Over the past two years, Carol has continued treatment, now through immunotherapy, and her appreciation for the Cancer Center only deepens. "Every time someone comes to get me from the waiting room, I think, 'Oh, my favorite!' because they all are my favorite," she says with a smile.

One moment stood out especially: After meeting a new nurse for the first time, Carol later received a handwritten card thanking her for the privilege of providing her care. "Whoever selects the staff here knows exactly what they are doing."

Her oncologist, Dr. Shaikh, has been a constant source of strength. "He has the most honest and encouraging bedside manner. He always gave me the facts, but he also always made me feel like I knew why what they were doing was important. I think he works miracles."

Looking back, Carol shares three pieces of advice for anyone newly diagnosed:

1. Stay off Dr. Google.

"It can be a terrifying place."

2. Advocate for yourself.

"If I hadn't asked about treatment closer to home, I wouldn't have been placed at FHN."

3. Take a support person.

"It can be overwhelming, and having someone to absorb the information makes all the difference."

"Immunotherapy has been one of the cornerstone treatments of the future of cancer, and the indications are only expected to broaden," says Dr. Shaikh. "I have seen remarkable benefit across various cancers, particularly melanoma."

Group (POG), patients benefit from the expertise of Bobby Koneru, MD, a board-certified radiation oncologist and national speaker on advanced cancer therapies.

Dr. Koneru provides patients with access to **state-of-the-art stereotactic radiosurgery**, which **precisely targets tumors** with fewer, high-dose treatments while preserving surrounding healthy tissue. He also brings a patient-first philosophy. He explains,

Every patient is different.

I try to understand what the patient's needs are and make a collaborative decision between standard recommendations and what is unique for them and their family.

Dr. Koneru emphasizes that patients receive care comparable to major academic centers: "This facility offers all of the latest technologies, with a team that truly takes the time to know each patient."

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE OR MOST REWARDING PART OF YOUR JOB?

I love being able to listen to patients' stories and to help them feel heard and seen. Although it may sometimes be difficult, I am gratified to have tough, deep conversations with people and help support them through really difficult times in their lives. It makes sense, then, that the favorite part of my training was working with the hospice and palliative medicine doctors. That experience helped me be a better communicator with my patients and their families.

WHAT CAN PATIENTS EXPECT WHEN THEY WORK WITH YOU?

First of all, I would tell them that I like to partner with patients to make healthcare decisions together and help people to take a more active role

in their healthcare. I also try to meet people where they are at and help them work toward their healthcare goals in a way that feels authentic to them.

HOW DO YOU HELP PATIENTS FEEL INVOLVED IN THEIR CARE?

I try to present all options when we are making a healthcare decision and give my reasoning for these opinions. That way, patients can decide what makes sense for them.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE HOBBY OR SKILL?

I enjoy a broad variety of pastimes

– maybe I like collecting hobbies!

my kids, crochet, video games, nature
walks, live concerts in my car, and the

IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE YOU WOULD LIKE TO SHARE?

Reading and literacy are very important to me ... so much so, in fact, that I hand out books at my well-child appointments! I also volunteered at story time at the Freeport Public Library this year, representing FHN. I'm usually in the library about once a week, and one of my favorite things to do with my kids is to read stories to them. Since I am from Freeport, I have fond memories of going to our library when I was young, and I enjoy nurturing that tradition.

I am very intentional about both the books that I read and the ones I choose to read to my children. I focus on books about, and written by, people with diverse backgrounds and cultures that are different from our own, because I believe that their stories are important to learn and to share. Movementis Medicine.

Studies have shown that regular exercise – just moving around – improves your health.

In the past few years, researchers have shown that physical activity can:

- Strengthen your heart by lowering blood pressure, cholesterol and inflammation
- Alleviate some symptoms of Parkinson's disease and slow its progression
- Reduce your risk of developing type 2 diabetes
- Improve your brain health and slow age-related memory issues

But what if movement itself hurts?

It's difficult to play pickleball with a painful shoulder or go for a walk if your knee won't cooperate.

FHN's Orthopedics and Sports Medicine team can help, with three surgeons trained in a wide range of specialties, to the physical and occupational therapists who will work with you to regain strength and ease of movement.

Our team is led by **Kevin Draxinger, MD**, who has been caring for patients at FHN for nearly 20 years. Dr. Draxinger earned his medical degree from the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, Canada and served a fellowship in spine surgery at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, MD.

His specialties range from helping people of all ages with back pain or a fracture to caring for patients with injuries or conditions that limit movement, from minimally invasive knee arthroscopy and meniscus repair to total knee replacement; minimally invasive treatments to reduce shoulder pain to open rotator cuff repairs; hip replacement surgery; and treating patients affected by carpal tunnel syndrome or "trigger finger," which causes a person's finger to get "stuck" in a bent position.

Orthopedics and Sports Medicine specialist **Woodley Desir, MD**, joined FHN this spring. He earned his medical degree from the State University of New York Downstate Medical Center in Brooklyn, NY. He also earned a Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS) degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo in Buffalo, NY. He completed an orthopedic surgery residency at Howard University Hospital in Washington, DC, and served two

fellowships: Sports Medicine and Shoulder Surgery at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, TN, and Hip Preservation/Arthroscopy/ Reconstruction and Regenerative Medicine at the University of Colorado in Boulder, CO.

Dr. Desir has been caring for orthopedic patients since 2009, including high-performance athletes for the Nashville Predators NHL team and Vanderbilt University's Division 1 football, women's lacrosse, and baseball teams.

His specialties include hip preservation, regenerative medicine, hip, knee and shoulder reconstruction, and sports medicine.

For some patients, working with a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant is the answer to their problems. Our PT/R Team offers excellent non-surgical, drug-free options for conditions from back pain and muscle tears to arthritis and diseases like Parkinson's or cerebral palsy.

Our PT/R Team specializes in:

- Helping surgical patients recover and regain mobility
- Neurological conditions such as stroke, Parkinson's disease and multiple sclerosis
- Orthopedic and sport-related injuries
- Bio-mechanical problems and muscular control

- Vestibular vertigo impairments
- Back and neck pain
- Arthritis
- Acute or chronic pain
- Evaluation and treatment for flexibility and strengthening impairments
- Balance, exercise, and coordination training
- Recovery from work-related injuries
- Recuperation from injuries
- Developmental delay or another neuromuscular dysfunction
- Therapeutic exercise, range of motion and stretching exercise

- Gait (walking training)

Mercyhealth FHN: Growing and Serving Together

With an eye on the region's future, the FHN Board of Directors made a deliberate and proactive decision this fall: FHN will partner with Mercyhealth to continue offering and expand healthcare services in northwest Illinois.

The statistics are sobering: More than 760 U.S. hospitals are struggling financially and at risk of closure, including 16 hospitals in Illinois.* Less than 24 percent of hospitals nationwide remain independent.

"In the past few years, we've seen a number of healthcare facilities closing, declaring bankruptcy, or just holding on until they were about to close to be forced into a situation where they didn't get much input in what happens going forward," says FHN President and CEO Mark Gridley.

"We are very proud to have been providing healthcare in northwest Illinois for more than 120 years, and the first priority for FHN's leadership and board was to preserve and continue that legacy for generations to come," Gridley says.

The board started researching the possibility of working with larger healthcare organizations in the past year to preserve FHN's commitment to providing care close to home while ensuring that patients have access to the advanced, specialized services they need.

Through these discussions, "our true north has been to see how any solution going forward would be better than what we could do on our own – not just for the short term, but for the foreseeable future," Gridley says. "We didn't want to just survive, but to grow."

During our diligence discussions, there were options from other organizations that didn't emphasize growth, lacked a willingness to make strong financial investments in our area, and some even included significant reductions in locations, services, and even in the number of our highly talented caregivers.

"That was pretty simple for us to say, 'No, thank you'," Gridley says. Our local healthcare system provides more than care – FHN is one of the

largest employers in the region – and keeping, even growing, those jobs remains a priority.

Mercyhealth was willing to make a significant capital investment, and shared with the board that the organization saw northwest Illinois and FHN as a growth opportunity.


"They saw a lot of potential to grow their market share, but also to grow FHN's potential – our services and our people, and our own market share," Gridley says. "They saw the potential to grow FHN and Mercyhealth as a regional medical center, not just keep the doors open, but invest in improving local healthcare."

The agreement, Gridley says, will have almost immediate benefits.

Mercyhealth has committed to investing \$100 million in FHN over the next five years.

Plans are underway to purchase and install a new linear accelerator for the FHN Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center at FHN Memorial Hospital in Freeport. This multimillion-dollar upgrade will keep the Cancer Center on the cutting edge of radiologic cancer care.

Other plans include a robotic surgical system in the hospital's operating rooms to expand and upgrade FHN's surgical capabilities. This investment, along with Mercyhealth's extensive



residency and fellowship programs, will serve as a pipeline of new physicians to the region, helping to ensure patients don't need to travel to hospitals more than an hour away for the care they need.

Patients will receive the benefit of a fully integrated EPIC- Electronic Health Record across the entire system of over 900 providers throughout northern Illinois as well as the state-of-the-art functionality that they deserve to make working with their care team even better than the current options.

By joining forces with Mercyhealth, we are

taking an active step to preserve and strengthen care for our patients. The directors of our board are proactive thinkers, and they want what is best for their families, friends, neighbors and communities, too.

Mercyhealth has announced a commitment of at least \$100 million for capital needs and projects. That is a large investment in our communities, and includes projects that the foundation had been focused on, such as replacing the linear accelerator for the FHN Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center. However, even that level of funding will not completely cover all costs related to improving healthcare in our region. There are still more needs to be met and the FHN Foundation is here to assist in providing the resources to meet them.

One such project is to **purchase new defibrillators for the healthcare system**. This project rose to the top of things that the Foundation

wanted to accomplish through conversations with many local donors about potential projects. The donors identified new defibrillators as a priority because of the life-changing impact that they can make.

If your heart stops beating or you have a life-threatening heart rhythm, you are in need of a defibrillator. A defibrillator is a medical device that delivers an electric shock to your heart to restore a normal heartbeat. When you are watching a medical television show and the actor who is portraying a doctor says "Clear!", a defibrillator is being utilized. A defibrillator can save your or your loved one's life.

The FHN Foundation is now focused on raising funds to replace the defibrillators in the hospital. Through this replacement, numerous adults' and children's lives will be saved in our Emergency Department and throughout the hospital setting. The new defibrillators have enhanced features to ensure that while the patient is being monitored, documentation of the patient's heart rhythm and any medications administered are recorded.

Through your donation to replace defibrillators, you truly will be part of **SAVING A LIFE!** The total cost to replace 15 defibrillators is \$300,000 (see sidebar with additional information).

Just as healthcare is at the heart of every community, defibrillators are at the heart of quality cardiac care.

During this time of transition, I hope that you will celebrate FHN's past and impact on the community, look forward to the future of healthcare in our region, and rally with us around this important project. **WITH YOUR HELP**, the FHN Foundation can purchase these new defibrillators. While this equipment has a cost, a patient's life is priceless.

How is a Hospital-Grade Defibrillator Different Than a Typical AED?

Most people are familiar with defibrillators (AEDs) that are used in businesses and public spaces. In these situations, the AEDs are housed in little boxes throughout the facility. These AEDs are placed in these locations in the event of an emergency, and would be used prior to an ambulance getting there. These devices provide basic monitoring and 'shocking' to a person's heart when needed.

The defibrillators used in the hospital are much more advanced. Capabilities include:

- Being able to view the patient's heart rhythm on a monitor
- Changing the voltage for the shock depending on the patient's needs
- Monitoring features like pulse ox and end tidal CO2 (patient's ventilation)
- · Reading blood pressure
- Capturing a certain part of the heart rhythm and using the pacemaker feature to give small shocks to the heart (acting as a pacemaker while a patient is being treated)
- Using the machine for cardioversion (which is when the machine is able to deliver a controlled shock at just the right time in order to convert back to a regular rhythm)
- Capturing all the parts of a code on the strips that print (that way when someone who knows where to look examines the monitor they can see when we gave meds, delivered shocks, or provided other types of care)

With the newer technology we are seeking there will be additional features that are available to enhance efficiency for emergencies throughout the hospital.
